Unnecessary Loss

Stinking smut of wheat is increasing at an alarming rate. In the inspection year, August 1st, 1943, to July 31st, 1944, 363 cars graded 'smutty'. The year before, only 157. This year, from August 1st to December 17th, only four and a half months, 347 cars have been classed 'smutty'.

Farmers would be wise to remember the following facts:

1. Thatcher is more susceptible to stinking smut than any of the well known varieties except Red Bobs and Reward.
2. Cold soil provides favourable conditions for the development of the disease. Very early sowing and cold weather after seeding increase the likelihood of smut in the crop if the seed is smutty.
3. A farmer may get by with straight grade wheat for years in spite of the presence of some smut. Then, due to a gradual increase of the disease or a sudden increase due to particularly favourable conditions, he may suffer a loss of about \$200.00 per car as a result of smut.
4. Stinking smut causes loss in yields as well as in grade.
5. Treatment with a mercurial dust costs about 5 cents, plus labour and equipment, per bushel of seed.
6. Formalin often seriously retards and weakens germination and, thus, encourages weeds and reduces yields.
7. Seed treatment, properly carried out, will control the disease.

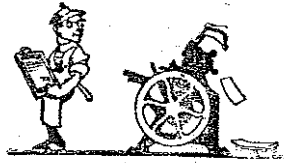

A " PRACTICAL CHRISTMAS MESSAGE".

Calling it a "practical Christmas message" from the people of Saskatchewan to their old folks, lonely mothers, dependent children and a number of blind persons" Hon. C.W. Valleau acting minister of Public Health, announced medical care provisions for these groups effective as of January 1st.

Medical and surgical services, hospitalization and drugs required by eligible persons will be paid for by the department of health, subject to certain restrictions and provided applications are approved by the social welfare department.

Some 25,000 persons will be benefit from this step.

SASKATCHEWAN CO-OP LEADER.

In volume of business done by co-operatives, Saskatchewan led the Dominion in 1943 with a total of \$100,423,432, according to the Dominion report from the Department of Agriculture.

Ontario ranked next to Saskatchewan with \$55,966,902 of co-operative business.

The machinery co-operative has taken over the machinery and farm hardware factory operated in Winnipeg by the Cregg Manufacturing Co. Ltd.

Farmers of the three prairie provinces undertook the venture in an effort to lower the costs of farm machinery.

HALL OF FAME
No. 9**

Miss Winnifred Kydd, of Montreal, slim, smart, lovely, is still on the sunny side of thirty but she has captured the highest honors ever to be given a woman in Canada.

She is the youngest person ever to be president of the National Council of Women, having gained that office four years after her first public speech.

Now holds the following offices: vice-president of the Montreal Y. W. C. A.; vice-president, International Council of Women; vice-president Montreal Children's Library Committee; President Women's Debating Society; member, Permanent Conference for the Protection of Immigrants; captain, Girl Guides.

Not content with this she accepted a deanship of women at Queen's University and distinguished herself by immediately establishing a girl's smoking room.

Was the first Canadian woman to be appointed to the World Disarmament Conference. The honor was not too great. She kept it a secret for a whole month.

Has a sense of humor, is considered brilliant, tactful and possessed of an engaging personality so that her ability to dominate women older, more experienced, more learned is no mystery. Is an internationalist, a believer in disarmament and a champion of women, believing in their capabilities and their eventual place in the sun.

Educated at McGill University and Bryn Mawr, she is the daughter of a Montreal financier.

GARNET WHEAT

After August 1st next, under "Amendments Made to The Canada Grain Act," very small mixtures of Garnet in other kinds of wheat, or of other kinds of wheat in Garnet, will lower the grade. Mixtures of varieties in the field can be detected by examination of the heads. To assist farmers to recognize mixtures in their own crops the Searle Grain Company at each elevator has a Demonstrative Plot where the important varieties of wheat, oats and barley will be found growing in a pure state. Farmers are invited and recommended to visit these plots.
